Project Overview

Hutt City Council engaged StudioC
Design to run two co-design workshops
with key stakeholders to consider
the alignment of Council projects in
Petone, to identify the challenges and
opportunities, and to establish priorities
for Council investment.

The sessions were based on Petone 2040, and incorporated additional updated information around climate change, the District Plan review, other related projects, and community engagement on the neighbourhood hub. The sessions also included consideration of sites of significance to mana whenua.

This document captures the ideas of those at the workshops using sketches to bring community voice to life. All of the visuals included in this report, are by no means intended or indicative of final designs. They are simply a tool for us to summarise ideas by using visual aids to showcase what is important to the community. These ideas will be tested for viability and affordability as part of the ongoing process.

Links to pre-read material

Workshop participants were sent a pre-reading information pack with updates on the key projects relevant to each workshop. This ensured everyone had the relevant background to be able to consider how Council should prioritise and coordinate Petone projects.

Workshop 1 focused on the area around The Esplanade, while Workshop 2 focused on Petone's town centre.

Workshop 1: The Esplanade

The purpose of Workshop 1 was for participants to consider the area around The Esplanade, the challenges and opportunities for the future, and what Council should prioritise for investment. Specifically, we wanted participants to consider the wharf and how that site is likely to be used in the future.

Recommendations from Workshop 1:

- Remove car traffic and buildings from The Esplanade.
- Prioritise restoring natural habitats and creating spaces for recreation in different areas along The Esplanade.
- Improve the area's accessibility.
- Strengthen connections to other parts of Petone.
- Highlight mana whenua's history and aspirations for the future.
- Consider less expensive options for the wharf.

We created this map of The Esplanade to show the current projects in the area (white), alongside mana whenua sites of significance (yellow). Workshop participants used the map to visualise connections and overlaps among all of these.





Theme 1:

Think ahead to the Esplanade of the future


Problem:

The Esplanade is currently bordered by a very busy road, but the planned Cross Valley Connection project will take traffic away. There was a strong theme around taking that opportunity to return the Esplanade to a recreational space for locals and visitors.

Opportunity:

The road will become a local route for people to access the beach and foreshore. Narrowing the road will create space for more natural habitat and recreation.

Insight: How might we create a smaller footprint for cars, creating more space for recreation, restoring nature, and enhancing micro-mobility?





Theme 2:

Restore the natural environment by removing buildings from the Esplanade


Problem:

Over time sea-level rise and increasing storm surges will threaten existing - and any new - buildings along The Esplanade.

Opportunity:

As buildings need to be relocated, encourage shifting them to the western and eastern ends to create space for recreation and habitat restoration.

Insight: How might we create a stretch of foreshore uninterrupted by built structures, creating opportunities for restoration and recreation?





Theme 3:

Restore nature through kaitiakitanga


Problem:

Human development and impacts have damaged and (in some cases) destroyed natural habitats along the foreshore.

Opportunity:

Rehabilitate and restore native habitats and protect native species by limiting human development and activities in some areas.

Insight: How might we identify some areas where the focus is protecting and restoring natural habitats and human activities are restricted for the benefit of all?





Theme 4:

Improve accessibility

Problem:

Not everyone is able to access and enjoy The Esplanade currently. For example, the pavement is too rough for bikes and buggies in places and a lot of carparking is used by commercial vehicles.

Opportunity:

Provide better access to The Esplanade so everyone can enjoy the natural environment and different forms of recreation.

Insight: How might we make The Esplanade more accessible to everyone, including kids on skates, scooters, the elderly, the mobility impaired, bikers, runners, and sight-seers?

"Make this a place for all ages. We want people to be able to access and appreciate the space." Wide, smooth pavement that can be used by wheelchair users, kids on skates, scooters and bikes "Don't lose accessible carparks with "Teens lack other places to go." Park with views (and adequate rubbish bins) for a view families, elderly, and mobility impaired." "Continue language of uranga but have parking ones too, so people can rest in the rubbish bins comfort of their cars!"



Theme 5:

Strengthen connections

Problem:


Petone lacks connections among its key amenities (for example, The Esplanade and Jackson St), which makes it difficult for people to move around. There also also limited opportunities to connect with whānau, with Petone's history, and with the natural environment.

Opportunity:

Create stronger connections between The Esplanade and:

- Petone train station
- Jackson St
- the eastern and western shared pathways.

Insight: How might we use design and wayfinding to create these stronger connections?





Theme 6:

Create recreation zones for different activities

Problem:

People use The Espalande and beach for many different recreational activities, some of which may conflict with each other or desire different things for the area.

Opportunity:

Create 'zones' for different types of activities in different areas, so that The Esplanade caters to diverse interests.

> Insight: How might we segment the Esplanade into recreational zones that mirror the activities that are popular here?

"Variety. What I noticed from the workshop was that everyone liked a different part of the beach for a different reason. Having some public areas, secluded areas, dog areas, play areas, café etc. most people's interests were catered for. Maybe that variety makes it such a gool asset for the Hutt and wider Wellington region." "Having a single sports club building is hard to maintain whereas a combined

water sports clubs building could share facilities and costs across a wider section of the community and offer more opportunities to water based activities for the Hutt residents."

Theme 7:

Highlight mana whenua history and aspirations

Problem:

Mana whenua history and cultural narratives are currently missing, and sites of significance to iwi are not marked or recognised.

Opportunity:

Tell mana whenua stories and history and give effect to their aspirations for the future.

> Insight: How might we use signage and design to showcase mana whenua?

"When we walk through Pito-one, we don't see our names and faces."

Theme 8:

Show identity and heritage through storytelling

Problem:

People need ways to connect to the history and cultural narratives of Petone.

Opportunity:

Use storytelling to create a consistent design theme connecting sites throughout Petone and highlighting its unique history and cultural narratives.

Insight: How might we use stories to connect Petone's main areas and reflect its unique identity and heritage?


"Create places to see what the beach was like pre-1840. How do we connect to what it used to be like?"

"Use uranga to unite The Esplanade with the shared pathways at both ends, creating a single walking and cycling pathway around the Wellington harbour."



Theme 9:

Create less expensive options for the wharf


Problem:


Repairing the whole wharf is not feasible and saving part of it is very expensive and will use limited resources that are needed elsewhere in the community.

Opportunity:

Create a new structure that nods to the wharf's history but can be used for recreation and storytelling.


Insight: How might we create a wharf that commemorates the past and creates recreation and storytelling opportunities for the future?


"It has low use and the cost of repair or replacement appears very high for its amenity value. Currently it creates a barrier for the Wellington rowing and ski clubs based in the Green shed (soon to be the new Integrated Clubs Building)."

"Removing it would open up the entire foreshore for all watersports."

"I'm pragmatic about it - the funds could be used elsewhere."

"The wharf is the reason for Te Ati Awa losing their presence in the area and our sites being desecrated."

"I'm keen for the wharf to come out - the cost is horrific and risk too high." "As a community we have limited resources and I don't want to spend it on the wharf."



Summary of wharf options:

Most feedback recognised that the increased cost and limited amenity value mean that retaining the full wharf is no longer the best use of a significant investment in Petone.

A number of alternate ways to provide waterfront amenity and social, cultural and economic value were identified:

Create sculptural artwork to commemorate the wharf

• Demolish some or all of the wharf and instead build something to commemorate the wharf and reflect the cultural heritage of Petone.

Retain but create lighter footprint - shorten it or build pontoon


- The wharf is a highly valued local landmark, and some people would ideally like to retain part of it and/or re-use some part of the structure.
- If retaining part of the wharf is not feasible/affordable, there are a number of
 ways to provide waterfront amenities, ranging from retaining a short section of
 the wharf to replacing it with a shorter, lighter structure over the water to enable
 recreation.

Build ūranga or viewing platform/s

- Participants said that the wharf should be more accessible. Also, it is a chance to be above the water (rather than in/on it) and to have a different perspective of Petone.
- A viewing platform could achieve these objectives and carry through the ūranga concept from the Te Ara Tupua project to The Esplanade.

Allocate investment to other areas on The Esplanade

- There was also a lot of support for improvements to the broader area (west Petone, Victoria Street, Te Puni Street through the train station and, Jackson Street) and the opportunity to tell the cultural narrative through wayfinding and design.
- There was strong support for ensuring that The Esplanade is developed to make the most of the opportunity of the two new cycleways at either end, and the expected increase in visitors.
- There was support for investment in bringing the Petone 2040 vision of a better connected 'town centre' to life through better connections to The Esplanade.



Workshop 2: Creating a town centre


The purpose of Workshop 2 was for participants to consider ways to strengthen Petone's town centre, and what Council should prioritise for investment. Specifically, we wanted participants to consider the Petone Library (in need of urgent refurbishment), Petone Rec and grandstand, and a potential Buick St "amenity corridor".

Recommendations from Workshop 2:

- Consider moving the library and other Council services to create a town centre at Petone Rec OR build the town centre around the current library site.
- Make the town centre more pedestrian friendly through new walking paths and a laneway.
- Improve public transport options around the town centre.
- Improve the playground by Petone Rec.

We created this map of central Petone to show the current projects in the area (white), alongside common walking routes (yellow).

Workshop participants used the map to visualise their future town centre.





Option 1: **Build town centre around current library site**

Opportunity:

The library site is close to Jackson St and other key amenities and could be activated and connected more clearly with other key attractions throughout Petone.

Insight: How might we activate the area around the current library?





Option 2: Create a new town centre at Petone Rec

Problem:

Petone currently lacks an identifiable town centre that links key attractions. Also, the Rec is not well utilised.

Opportunity:


Create a town centre at the Rec by building a multi-purpose outdoor space and community hub.

Insight: How might we create a town centre in Petone that weaves together spaces for outdoor recreation and events alongside key community services?

"Make the Rec a community hub like Walter Nash, for indoor sports and community gatherings. No one uses the grandstand!"

"Build a korowai (cloak) that serves as a canopy/protection against wet weather for sports and events" "Keep the name 'Rec'; 'village green' sounds too colonial."




"Consolidation of function and activities flexible, multi-purpose, and meet family and community needs and create a Petone 'centre'."

"Focus on the Rec - move the library there and create a hub feel. I love the korowai idea."

Specific idea: improve playground near the Rec

The community told us the playground is a loved space but it's run-down and tired. Refurbish the playground to encourage more families to the area. The ideas on this page summarise participants' ideas for how we might create a unique and fun playground that draws families into the town centre.




"Include accessible play equipment"

Theme 2:

Make town centre more pedestrian friendly with new walking paths


Problem:

It's difficult to move around Petone without a car.

Opportunity:


Create clearly marked walking pathways to demarcate the informal routes people typically use now.

Insight: How might we use new walking paths to connect key amenities and make the town centre more pedestrian friendly?




Pedestrian friendly streets

How might we use new and existing walking paths to connect key amenities and make the town centre more pedestrian friendly?








Specific idea: Buick St heritage and arts trail

There is no connection and natural walkway between the Esplanade and Petone Rec. How might we create an interesting walkway along Buick St that encourages people to walk between the town centre and the Esplanade?





"Is there a piped stream under Buick St that could be opened up?"

"Make the street interesting (not just trees and green space)."

"Culture and heritage centre - connecting the culture and heritage assets; improve what we have in ūranga along Esplanade with connections/linkages to repositories at Settlers Museum and library"

Specific idea: create public transport loop

Creating a public transport loop around Petone centre, based on existing bus routes, would make it easier to move around Petone without a car. How might we encourage more people to use public transport to move around Petone?

Other ways to improve mobility/access:

- Improved access to accessible toilets
- Seating at regular intervals and under cover (esp at bus stops)
- Light rail linking Waterloo to Petone via Jackson St
- More bus stops: Jackson St between Elizabeth St and Buick St and on Britannia St
- Wider footpaths for scooters and/or pedestrians or shared walking/cycling streets in centre
- Support car share and bike share schemes (eg, through dedicated parking and rental bikes and scooters at the station)
- Improved bike parking and e-bike chargers (for larger cargo bikes too)
- "More pleasant green-ness to lift the walking and biking/ sitting experience"

"Create a public transport loop around Petone centre, using existing bus routes."

"Easy access to public transport is important."

"Need off-peak bus services for Jackson St nightlife."

"Go along side streets and to stations, so people can take public transport to shop."



"Free loop bus to link key landmarks and big box stores with Petone Station: station -> Udy St -> Cuba St -> Jackson St - #110 is nearly this loop already!"
