Council must consult on its Long-Term Plan

Under the Local Government Act 2002, Council:

- Must have a long-term plan at all times in order to provide an effective basis for public participation in decision-making processes relating to the longterm plan
- must use the special consultative procedure in adopting a long-term plan.

This requires Council to prepare and adopt a consultation document.

20 August:	agreed strategic framework, financial and forecasting

	Significance and Engagement Policy; approval of KPIs
12 December:	Development Contributions policy; Revenue and Financing policy; Infrastructure Strategy

Approach to Consultation

We want to achieve (our objectives):

- well-informed residents, businesses and communities;
- communities who are motivated to give feedback;
- simple and inclusive language to reach all sectors of our community;
- to demonstrate that Council is listening intently and is responsive;
- to give a range of means for people to provide feedback



Approach to Consultation

How we are going to do it:

- A mixed method approach
- Focussed set of consultation items
- Targeted information, making impacts clear to our community
- Eye-catching Infographics, images and graphs
- A succinct 30-40 page consultation document
- Supported by online materials
- Emphasis on in-person engagement
- Tools and resources to support in-person engagement activities



Consultation best practice

Consult in depth on only the top 5 or 6 priority areas which:

- align with the strategic framework and priorities that elected members have identified;
- have an impact on rates;
- have high public interest;
- have an impact on a broad cross-section of the community, rather than a limited group of residents or businesses; and
- offer meaningful options for the community to provide feedback on
